Background

The [Angus Climate Hub](#) is one of 24 hubs across Scotland funded by the Scottish Government. The hub was created in 2023 and provides place-based support for communities to take forward climate action initiatives. Each hub empowers local groups by offering training, seed funding, collaboration opportunities, and a platform for sharing knowledge and best practices.

The Angus hub, based at [Montrose Community Trust](#) works with partners [Angus Cycle Hub](#), and [Dronley Community Woodland](#) to support communities to make meaningful contributions to Scotland's net-zero goals.

Climate shocks and nature loss are hitting food crops hard. Thousands of hectares of food crops across Europe and beyond are lost to drought and flood each year. Scotland imports 80% of fresh produce. Developing local food resilience is essential for our communities, place and nature. It also supports the aspirations expressed in the [Good Food Nation Bill](#)

Job Role

To/build on the work of the Angus Climate Hub with a specific remit of local food resilience. Including food storage and growing and to connect with food hubs, community growing groups and schools.

Tasks may include:

- Build on existing work to map local food assets: resources, skills & equipment in Angus.
- Connect and support an Angus food resilience network
- Identify possible collaborative project with [Appetite for Angus](#) and [Bioregioning Tayside](#) to From existing map of food assets,
- identify 2–3 quick collaboration opportunities between existing groups and help broker introductions.
- Support delivery of a community food summit
- Establish a light-touch Angus Food & Growing Network (email group or quarterly online meet-up).
- Explore the feasibility of an Angus Seed Saving Network and report back with simple next steps.
- Produce a short end-of-year summary highlighting progress, gaps and recommendations for future development.



Skills & Experience

- Knowledge of and interest in food growing, food systems, nature and climate change.
- Experience of grassroots community working.
- Local knowledge of the Angus food system will be a distinct advantage.
- A proven ability to work with and develop relationships with people of different ages and backgrounds reflecting the different demographics within the Angus hub.
- Proven record on understanding varied food communities in Scotland and in particular Angus.
